FROM THE PASTOR . . .

"PASTOR, WHY IS THERE A TABLE IN FRONT OF THE ALTAR?"

It is a good question. As you may know, there is a new oak table in front of the altar. The table was made by a Verona resident, with oak from the Verona area.

The reason the table is there is primarily theological. The freestanding table is the oldest practice of the Church, which has recently been discovered in some of the earliest and oldest churches that we know. This practice helps us to see "that the Lord's supper celebrates the risen Christ in the midst of the people of God." The freestanding altar existed in the Church for many centuries, but changed during the Middle Ages. In the Middle Ages, altars started to appear against the wall, namely the eastern facing wall, symbolizing the idea that the east, or the place of the sunrise, symbolized the dawn of the

resurrection and the "promise of the second coming of Christ." In prayer, Christians often faced the east as a sign of their faith. However, that idea was quickly lost. When the "celebration of the Lord's Supper was made into the medieval sacrifice of the mass, it was as if the priest/pastor were holding up the sacrifice of Christ to God, perhaps even sacrificing Christ anew." The table or altar facing away from the people of God served this view.

However, this view of the altar or table does not fit well with our Lutheran understanding of the Lord's Supper. Here is what Martin Luther has to say about it:

Here in Wittenberg we retain the vestments, altar and candles until they are used up or we are pleased to make a change...In the true mass, however, of real Christians, the altar should not remain where it is, and the priest/pastor should always face the people as Christ doubtlessly did in the Last Supper. (LW 53:69)

As the Evangelical Lutheran Worship book, The Sunday Assembly says:

Even in Lutheran Churches, where the idea of sacrifice was rejected, the old practice of facing the wall was maintained, simply because Lutherans were so conservative...The result is that for the pastor to face away from the assembly...feels like an act of secrecy, of holy hiddenness, even though the promise of Christ calls for open and public proclamation. Many Lutherans, along with many other Christians, feel that the time of which Luther spoke has indeed come, and that the pastor should preside at the table facing the people. The assembly needs to have a sense that it is gathered around that table, sees and hears what happens there, has the promise of Christ clearly addressed to it, participates in the thanksgiving, and is made into a community through God's gift. From the Pastor continued . . .

For many years, this has been our understanding of the Lord's Supper here at St. James, and we have longed talked about doing something to the altar that would reflect that view. Some people have said that the new table blocks their view of the fresco of the Last Supper underneath the altar. This is unfortunate. Every attempt was made to make the table small enough so that it would not block the altar, or take away from the architectural integrity of our worship space. In addition, the altar is moveable, and will allow for moving it during weddings, or other times when it is needed. However, we feel that it was important for there to be a freestanding table in front of the altar. As Luther said, it more clearly communicates the understanding that the Lords Supper is a gracious meal given by a Gracious God, and this gift is open to all believers.

FALL 2011 BIBLE STUDY

Pastor Billings will be leading a 5-week Bible Study on the book of Revelation entitled *Revelation and the End of All Things*. The class is based upon the book and DVD by Professor Craig Koester of Luther Seminary, whom Pastor Billings worked with while a student at Seminary. The class will offer "an alternative way to understand Revelation, one that is designed to give people a sense of hope. The questions raised by contemporary speculation about Revelation serve as a prelude to the study of Revelation itself. What we find when we open the pages of the Scriptures is a message that is often surprisingly different from many of the popular treatments of Revelation's imagery. The visions in the book are not written in a secret code that is designed to confuse its readers. It is a book that was written to reveal or make known the gracious power of God and Christ, which stands over against the forces of sin and evil that seek to dominate our world."

The Bible Study will be held on Wednesdays, starting October 5th, and will offer two opportunities: 11:00 am - 12:00 pm or 7:00 pm - 8:00 pm.

SEPTEMBER IS NATIONAL CHOLESTEROL EDUCATION MONTH

Take some time in September to review the handouts at the blood pressure cubicle so you can be knowledgeable and proactive about your health. High cholesterol can be dangerous and it's something you can't see or feel. It must be checked by having a fasting blood sample ordered by your doctor. Know your cholesterol numbers, know your risk. High cholesterol is a major cause of heart disease or stroke, which claims a life every 33 seconds. (American Heart Association statistic, 2003) There will be new information weekly so you can learn more about living a long and healthy life.

Some people are long distance caregivers and some people are the primary caregiver or contact for a person in a facility.

This program can help reduce stress, improve self-confidence, assist with difficult decision making, provide support from others in your situation, balance your life and gain assistance finding other resources, among other things. OCTOBER IS NATIONAL BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

October provides an opportunity to promote screening and early detection of breast cancer. The earlier breast cancer is found the greater the chance of survival. One of the best methods of finding a breast lump is by doing your own monthly self-breast exam. The other is a yearly mammogram beginning at least by age 40, unless your MD tells you otherwise.

Breast cancer is the most common cancer among women in the United States aside from skin cancer. The American Cancer Society projects there will be 192,370 new cases of invasive breast cancer this year. There are at least 2.5 million survivors in this country.

No one knows why one person gets breast cancer over another. There are some risk factors that we can do nothing about: age- the rate increases with age; genes- BRCA1 and BRCA2 are two genes that greatly increase the risk; dense breasts; first period before age 12; and menopause after age 55. Some risk factors we might have some control over: being over-weight; hormone replacement therapy; birth control pills; birthing no children or having your first child after age 35; and drinking alcohol. There are a small percentage of men who are diagnosed with breast cancer.

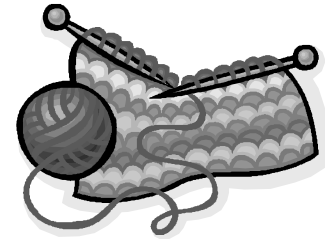
Smoking is the risk one has the greatest control over. According to the Department of Health and Human Services, "The more postmenopausal women (ages 50-79) smoked, the longer they smoked, and the earlier they started smoking the higher the risk." After quitting smoking the risk fell, but it takes up to 20 years to go back to that of a nonsmoker

Being proactive by being aware of risk factors, living a healthy life style, and educating yourself is powerful and can decrease fear. There are numerous sites on the internet with very useful information. The one that that I feel has many helpful links is the National Breast Cancer Awareness Month website. 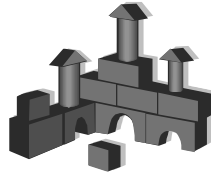
